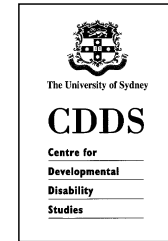

## Edwin Jones PhD

Bro Morgannwg NHS Trust &  
 Unit for the Development of Intellectual  
 Disabilities, University of Glamorgan, Wales. UK

Dr Jones is the leading international expert on Active Support. He is the first author of numerous peer-reviewed journal articles about Active Support. These include the first experimental evaluation of Active Support (Jones et al., 1999), as well as experimental studies on **systemic** implementation (involving 74 group homes) and on training Active Support trainers (Jones et al., 2001). Dr Jones directed the training video *Active Support*, and is the lead author of many Active Support training resources.

### What is Active Support?

*Active Support* is a research-based set of procedures which focus on the way group home staff work with consumers and the organisation of the group home to ensure that the primary focus is on direct support of meaningful resident activity. Active Support is designed to provide a positive alternative to the "hotel model" where staff do things *for* residents and residents become non-participating spectators in their own lives. Research in the UK and Australia has shown that implementation of Active Support results in more staff support of consumers, increased consumer participation in activities, and *improved consumer outcomes*.

- ◆ Representatives from Active Support projects in NSW, ACT and Victoria.
- ◆ Presentations from a range of stakeholders – service managers, direct-support staff, service users, evaluators, and researchers.

The forum will bring together (a) various groups who have been involved in the implementation and evaluation of Active Support in different parts of Australia, and (b) other interested people who wish to know more about Active Support, with a view to implementing this approach.

The idea is:

- to provide a very practical insight into the day-to-day realities of Active Support training and implementation,
- to undertake a constructive critical analysis of Active Support in the Australian context, and
- to enable people with an interest in Active Support to share information and learn from one another.

- links with Person Centred Planning
- group and individual exercises
- video based work.

This workshop will give:

- *experienced* Active Support trainers the skills and knowledge to undertake more effective Active Support training and implementation;
- those with *limited experience* of Active Support a very good idea of what it involves and how training is delivered to staff. For people with a good background in training and practical work with service users, they could possibly start to introduce Active Support into services.
